Sermon Questions (March 20, 2016)

- 1. Which is the Christian attitude?
 - a. A focus on our freedoms—all the things that we should rightfully be able to have.
 - b. A focus on our responsibilities—all the things that we should do.
 - c. A balance between freedoms and responsibilities.
- 2. Rather than asking, "I am allowed as a Christian to do this?" We should ask:
 - a. Is this going to serve God rather than me?
 - b. Is this going to help my Christian brothers and sisters?
 - c. Is this going to cause others to believe in Jesus?
- 3. Food offered to idols is always off limits because of Old Testament food laws. (Yes/No)
- 4. In verses 25–26, Paul says that Christians can do whatever they want, just as long as others do not see it. (Yes/No)
- 5. The reason why the Bible says here that a person should abstain from idol food at an unbelievers house is:
 - a. Eating idol food, no matter where, is participation in idolatry.
 - b. The unbeliever will make the judgment that the Christian approves idolatry or doesn't think it's that bad.
 - c. The unbeliever will think Christians worship idols too.
- 6. "So, whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do all to the glory of God" means that even in the most mundane (boring and uninteresting) tasks that we should do them to honor God. (Yes/No).
