Sermon Questions

- 1. People in the 1st century (0-99 AD) were much more likely to believe in an historical resurrection than people would today in the 21st century. (Yes/No)
- 2. If the resurrection of Jesus is not historically true, then Christianity is worthless. (Yes/No)

Heads Up: These are the questions we will ask to demonstrate the trustworthiness of the eye-witnesses to the resurrection.

- Were the eye-witnesses even there?
- Can their stories be corroborated?
- Do we have the original account preserved for us today?
- Were they telling the truth?
- 3. Circle four reasons why we know the gospels were written early (around 50AD) and not hundreds of years later:
