Ephesians 1:4 says, "even as he chose us in him before the foundation of the world." And verse 11 says, "In him we have obtained an inheritance, having been predestined according to the purpose of him who works all things according to the counsel of his will."

Jesus says in John 6:37, "All that the Father gives me will come to me, and whoever comes to me I will never cast out." And later in verse 44 he says, "No one can come to me unless the Father who sent me draws him. And I will raise him up on the last day."

Acts 13:48 says, "as many as were appointed to eternal life believed."

1 Corinthians 1:30 says, "It is because of him that you are in Christ Jesus, who has become for us wisdom from God—that is, our righteousness, holiness and redemption."

2 Thessalonians 2:13–14 says, "But we ought always to thank God for you, brothers and sisters loved by the Lord, because God chose you as firstfruits to be saved through the sanctifying work of the Spirit and through belief in the truth. He called you to this through our gospel, that you might share in the glory of our Lord Jesus Christ." (This verse puts the ends and means together!)

Isaiah 46:9–11 says, "I am God, and there is no other; I am God, and there is none like me, declaring the end from the beginning and from ancient times things not yet done, saying, 'My counsel shall stand, and I will accomplish all my purpose.... I have spoken, and I will bring it to pass; I have purposed, and I will do it."
